Statement of Support of IACL Associate Membership for Dr Henry Kha

As a longstanding Titular Member of the IACL, serving on a de facto National Committee for Australia (with Prof Cheryl Sanders and former Justice James Douglas), I am pleased to support Dr Kha's application for associate membership of our Academy.

We have already supported Dr Kha twice to be the Australian National Rapporteur to the Thematic Congresses of the International Academy of Comparative Law:

- In 2021 for the Thematic Congress in Pretoria, South Africa on the theme of 'Diversity and Plurality in the Law: Family Forms and Family's Functions.' His report was published into a book chapter – 'The Diversification of Family Forms and Functions in the Family Law of Australia' in Jacqueline Heaton and Aida Kemelmajer (eds), *Plurality and Diversity in Law: Family Forms and Family's Functions* (Intersentia, 2023).
- In 2024 for the Thematic Congress on the Teaching of Comparative Law.



Dr Kha has been a full-time academic for 7 years. He is currently a Senior Lecturer in the School of Private and Commercial Law within the Faculty of Law and Justice at the University of New South Wales, a leading law school in Australia. He was previously a Senior Lecturer in Law at Macquarie University (Australia) and Lecturer in Law at the University of Auckland (New Zealand), also very good law schools.

Dr Kha is particularly interested in researching comparative family law. He was the lead editor (with co-editor Professor Mark Henaghan from the University of Auckland) on a recently published edited book: *Teaching Family Law: Reflections on Pedagogy and Practice* (Routledge, 2024). The book featured a comparative analysis of teaching family law in different jurisdiction with leading scholars from around the world.

Dr Kha completed his PhD from the University of Queensland on “The Reform of English Divorce Law: 1857–1937” with a University of Queensland Research Scholarship. He graduated from the University of New South Wales with a Juris Doctor and was cited in the Dean’s List for Excellence in Academic Performance. He also graduated from the University of Sydney with a Bachelor of Arts (Advanced) (Honours) in Chinese studies and history and was awarded the University of Sydney Entry Scholarship. He has a Graduate Diploma of Legal Practice from the College of Law and was admitted to practice as a solicitor in the Supreme Court of New South Wales and the High Court of Australia.



Dr Kha has published a monograph on *A History of Divorce Law: Reform in England from the Victorian to Interwar Years* (Routledge, 2021). He has also published one edited book, 5 book chapters and 14 peer reviewed journal articles. He has extensive teaching experience and he has taught across a variety of private law subjects (including land law, equity and trusts, contracts, succession law and family law) and international children's rights law. Dr Kha has presented papers at multiple law conferences, including the British Legal History Conference and the Australian and New Zealand Law and History Conference. He has delivered presentations to the Law Society of New South Wales and the Francis Forbes Society for Australian Legal History in the Supreme Court of New South Wales. Dr Kha has made multiple media appearances, including on ABC (Australian Broadcasting Corporation) Radio National, a television appearance on SBS (Special Broadcasting Service) "Who Do You Think You Are?" program, and online news articles in The Conversation.

Dr Kha is the Treasurer for the Australian and New Zealand Law and History Society. He is also a Fellow of the Higher Education Academy.
